Fall Kick-Off Meeting PEAK OIL: Status and Prospects



Thursday, September 18, 2008 7:00 PM Corvallis-Benton County Public Library

Guest speaker: John Kaufmann, Oregon Department of Energy

John Kaufmann, Senior Policy Analyst at the Oregon Department of Energy, will be the main speaker at our Sept. 18th kick-off meeting at 7:00 p.m. at the Corvallis-Benton County Public Library. John has helped make Oregon a national energy leader through his work on energy efficiency and renewable energy over the past 25 years.

John also led Portland to be the first city in the US to plan for peak oil when he served as lead staff to the Portland Peak Oil Task Force. He has spoken about peak oil to the legislatures of Massachusetts, Connecticut, Vermont, and Minnesota, and was the keynote speaker at the LWVOR State Council in May. John received high praise for his comprehensive and eye-opening presentation.

"Peak Oil: Status and Prospects" will address the driving forces behind peak oil and peak natural gas, the current and future impacts of peak oil on the economy. the potential for other energy sources to supply global demand, and the potential for planning and economic behavior changes to reduce global energy demand.

Our kick-off meeting will begin at 7:00 pm with an overview of League programs for 2008-09. Come and learn how you can be involved with a variety of League issues. At 7:30 pm, our focus will shift to Peak Oil. Learn about this timely subject, have your questions answered, and find out what you can do.



Sustainability Fair and Town Hall Meeting #3 October 7th at Alumni Center

The Corvallis Sustainability Coalition's third and final Town Hall Meeting for 2008 will be held on Tuesday evening,

October 7th, at the CH2MHill Alumni Center on the OSU campus. A Sustainability Fair, featuring exhibits by the Coalition's partner organizations, will run from 5:30 to 7:00 pm, followed by the town hall meeting from 7:00 to 9:00 pm.



The focal point of the evening will be the Community Action Plan that has been developed by over 200 volunteers who have participated on 12 work groups during the past several months. Areas covered by the work groups include Community Inclusion, Economic Vitality, Education, Energy, Food, Health and Human Services, Housing, Land Use, Natural

Areas, Transportation, Waste, and Water.

Event organizers plan to use keypad polling (electronic voting) to assess participants' level of support for various aspects of the plan and to give immediate feedback to those in attendance. Attendees will also have an opportunity to select actions they would like to work on to help imple-

ment the plan.

Corvallis Energy Challenge: A Progress Report

Energy Trust of Oregon has released figures that show a lot of activity in Cor-

vallis from March 1 through July 15 – the

first four months of the year-long Corvallis Energy Challenge. During that time, Sustainability Coalition partners signed up over 800 homeowners for free home energy reviews. Of those, 545 reviews have been completed – five times the number done in the same period a year ago. In addition, there have been 28 business audits conducted – 28 more than were conducted in the same period a year ago.

Looking at the residential, commercial, and industrial energy-efficiency retrofits that have been made in the Corvallis area since March, as well as new solar installations, the total savings in terms of electricity is **over one**million kilowatt hours saved

since the Energy Challenge began in March, compared to 200,000 during the same period a year ago – nearly 5 times the savings. Thanks to Coalition partners' commitment to the Corvallis Energy Challenge, our community is moving toward greater energy efficiency and increased use of renewable energy.
